From 2001 to 2010, The Physiological Society had a standing agreement with the Australian Physiological Society (AuPS) whereby, in alternate years, The Society selected a lecturer to travel to Australia to deliver a short series of lectures in universities. This was a reciprocal arrangement with a member of the AuPS travelling to the UK in the intervening years. It was known as the Australian/UK Visiting Lectureship Scheme.

G L Brown Prize Lecture (peripatetic)

In 1975 The Physiological Society instituted a series of lectures in memory of Professor Sir Lindor Brown. The purpose of these lectures is to stimulate an interest in physiology. The Society chooses a lecturer whose name, with the title of the lecture, is then published. Departments are asked to notify The Society if they wish to invite the G L Brown Lecturer to their department. The lectures are not given during Scientific Meetings of The Society. Lectures since 1986 are published in *Experimental Physiology*, subject to the agreement of the Editorial Board. There is a £1000 prize, which consists of £750 for the award and £250 as an honorarium.

Otto Hutter Teaching Prize

In 2009 The Society launched the Otto Hutter Teaching Prize to recognise outstanding teachers of undergraduate physiology and to raise the profile of physiology teaching. The prize's namesake, Professor Otto Hutter, emeritus Regius Professor of Physiology at University of Glasgow, is recognised as a passionate and innovative teacher. He pioneered perhaps the first, fully-integrated electrophysiological lab for junior teaching. He was also a virtuoso of small group teaching, famous for throwing the blackboard chalk to students as an inducement to do some of the board-work. The £1000 prize includes £500 for the winner and £500 for the host institution (the latter to support education and teaching in physiology). In addition, the recipient is invited to present a lecture at the main meeting.

The Paton Prize

The Paton Prize was established in 1994 by the Historical Studies & Archives Committee to encourage the study of the history of the major ideas and concepts that have shaped modern physiology. The Prize takes the form of a bursary to support such studies, with funding of up to £1,000 to cover travel and incidental expenses. The Subcommittee wishes to promote interest in the history of physiology among younger Affiliates and Members of The Society, as well as more established scientists. It is intended that these bursaries will be financed by the interest on The Paton Fund, being an endowment fund originated by a donation from Professor Sir William Paton with a matching donation from The Society.

The Physiological Society Annual Public Lecture

The Physiological Society initiated an annual public lecture in 2005 to be delivered at The Society's Main Meeting. The Lecture is designed to further the promotion and public understanding of physiology to the general public and schools.

Sharpey-Schafer Lecture and Prize

In 1980 and 1981 The Physiological Society received bequests from Sir Edward Sharpey-Schafer and from his daughter Miss G M Sharpey-Schafer to institute a triennial lecture to be given alternately by an established physiologist (preferably but not necessarily from abroad) and by an early-career physiologist chosen by The Society. The lecture, to be called 'The Sharpey-Schafer Lecture, is in memory of Sir Edward Sharpey-Schafer FRS and of his grandson Professor E P Sharpey-Schafer FRCP, who was Professor of Medicine at St Thomas' Hospital, London. In 1990 the Committee agreed that the lecturer should also receive a Prize from funds accumulating from the bequests. It is customary, but not mandatory, for the lecture to be published in *Experimental Physiology*, subject to the approval of the Editorial Board.

Wellcome Prize Lecture - discontinued

The Wellcome Trustees agreed in 1985 to provide a sum of money to enable The Physiological Society to institute a Prize Lecture for young physiologists to encourage them and bring their work to general notice. The Prize, to be awarded biennially by a panel comprising members of the Prizes & Prize Lectures Committee and a representative nominated by the Wellcome Trust, is in the form of a lecture, an award and a medal presented at the Annual General Meeting in the year of the award. These lectures are, subject to the agreement of the Editorial Board, published in *The Journal of Physiology*. This scheme will be reviewed by the Wellcome Trustees in 2008.

The lecturer must be a young physiologist (less than 40 years of age) who is permanently resident in the UK or Republic of Ireland, who is considered to have made an outstanding contribution to physiological science. There is a £1,000 prize, which consists of £500 for the award and £500 as an honorarium.
